## Being Torn Between Two Offers

### How to Compare Roles and Make the Right Call

Landing one job offer is exciting. Getting two? That's a great position to be in — but it can also lead to a tough decision. When both roles have potential, how do you choose the one that's truly right for you?

Rather than rushing into a decision based on salary alone, it's worth taking a closer look at what each offer really means for your long-term goals, your daily life and your peace of mind.

#### LOOK BEYOND THE PAYCHECK

Salary is important, but it's just one piece of the picture. Consider the full compensation package: benefits, vacation time, retirement options and any bonuses or perks.

Then, think about the job itself. What are the hours? The commute? Is it remote, hybrid or in-person? Do you see yourself thriving in the pace and expectations of the role?

Don't forget about growth. Ask yourself which job offers more room to develop your skills, take on challenges or work with people you can learn from. A slightly lower salary might be worth it if the role offers stronger potential in the long run.

#### CONSIDER CULTURE AND LEADERSHIP

The people you work with can make or break a job. Reflect on the interview process — did one team seem more collaborative, more organized or more invested in your success?

Company culture isn't just about snacks in the break room. It's about communica-

tion, respect, work-life balance and how feedback is handled. Try to picture yourself working there every day. Does it feel energizing or draining?

If possible, reach out to current or former employees to get a behind-the-scenes perspective. Sometimes, the intangibles — how you're treated, how you're supported — matter

more than the title on your business card.

#### USE A SCORECARD — OR YOUR GUT

For some, it helps to make a list. Write down your priorities — whether it's flexibility, salary, mentorship or job security — and rate each offer against those values.

But also, trust your instincts.

Sometimes your gut knows more than your pros-and-cons list. If one offer feels exciting and the other feels safe but uninspiring, it may be a sign of where your heart truly lies.

Saying no to a good offer is never easy, but the goal is to choose the one that's best for you. You've worked hard to earn this moment — now you get to shape what comes next.



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
