Be respectful of their time, come prepared to meetings and look for ways you can offer value in return, such as sharing rele-

vant articles or assisting with projects.

STAY OPEN AND COMMITTED

A strong mentoring relationship is built on trust, respect and consistency. Be open to feedback, even when it challenges you, and show gratitude for the time and insights your mentor shares. Over time, a mentor can become not just a guide but a lasting advocate and supporter in your career journey.
